You Can Help Timberland Regional Library join the OverDrive Million Checkout Club in 2019!

Nearly 27,000 TRL patrons have used OverDrive this year so far to check out over 725,000 ebooks and audiobooks. Checkouts are currently on pace to reach about 975,000 by the end of year, but we have faith that together we can push it over the million mark! If you have not yet been a digital ebook or audiobook user, this is a great time to start, it's easy!

Visit the TRL OverDrive website and log in with your library card and PIN. Browse, check out, and start reading and listening! New ebooks and audiobooks are added every week. Your librarians create lists to highlight titles beyond the bestsellers and there are thousands of ebooks and audiobooks available to check out right now.

Download the Libby App to a mobile device via your preferred app store [APPLE] [ANDROID] and follow the step-by-step log in instructions. Search the digital library, borrow, and you'll be reading or listening in minutes.

If you read on a Kindle device, find out how to get library ebooks delivered to your Kindle account. If your Kindle is compatible, the Libby app can send your library books to it.

TRL staff are always willing to help you get started or answer questions. Visit your local library location (bring your device if you're having trouble) or contact the Ask-A-Librarian service.



Lynda.com is still available in 2019

The transition from Lynda.com to LinkedIn Learning that we were anticipating has now been "paused" until at least January 2020. The Washington State Library, which funds Lynda.com for participating Washington libraries, including TRL, has done an excellent job negotiating with LinkedIn and conveying all our concerns.

Sept. 19, 2019 Statement from LinkedIn:

First, thank you for being a valued customer and working so closely with us on the migration from Lynda.com to LinkedIn Learning. While we are excited about the learning experience we offer on LinkedIn Learning, we've made the decision to pause your transition.

While we've worked with many of our public library customers on this transition, we recognize that there are ongoing concerns about some of the changes we are making. This pause will give us time to continue our discussions with the library community and understand if we can build an online learning solution that meets the needs of public libraries and library patrons. While we cannot commit to any changes in our approach at this time, this pause will give us time to have the right, thoughtful discussions.

"There There" by Best-Selling Author Tommy Orange



This year for Timberland Reads Together (TRT), our district-wide book club, we chose to highlight Native authors and craftspeople. Approximately 300 people attended our main TRT event with Tommy Orange, author of "There There", at the Washington Center for the Performing Arts on Sunday, September 22.

The evening started with a blessing and drum song by Joe Seymour from Squaxin Island. Donna Barron, Director of Evergreen's Native Pathways program conducted the author interview. After the interview, Tommy was gifted with a Skokomish blanket by Native Pathways Faculty Member, Yvonne Peterson [first row of photos]. After the main event, Tommy Orange met with attendees to sign books and copies of the stunning event poster created by TRL Graphic Designer, Nicole June [shown in the bottom row of photos].


Tommy is a citizen of the Cheyenne and Arapaho Tribes. He engaged the audience with stories of growing up in Oakland with a Native father and a hippie mother on a street where almost

everyone was bicultural. Apparently the most he had hoped for from writing the book was that he would get a job teaching in the MFA program at the Institute of American Indian Arts, so the success of his book caught him by surprise... Oh, and along with becoming a successful author, he did get that job at IAIA.

2020-2022 Strategic Direction

The past year has been an encouraging time as the lead of the Strategic Planning Committee for Timberland Regional Library. While engaging with communities during Community Conversations and conducting Community Check-ins to get feedback on the first two drafts of the 2020-2022 Strategic Direction, something was made clear to me: There are many people that care deeply about the future of their community library.

Another thing was also made clear: We were receiving attention and feedback from a very narrow segment of our population.

I was relieved to hear from the majority of communities during these meetings and through our online surveys that they had the same concern. They didn't see the diversity that exists in their communities represented. This feedback reinforced what frontline staff, the TRL Administrative Team, and Board of Trustee members have also listed as an area in which we need work.

The great thing about having this concern confirmed by our community while we are working through the strategic planning process, is that we are able to plan to address it in a holistic manner. In our draft plan we have made equity, diversity, and inclusion a focus area. We have also made local communities a focus area. These strategic focus areas allow us to address the concern about limited community engagement in a concerted and meaningful way through our district tactical plan while also allowing counties and communities to address things specific to their local level.
