MINUTES

A public hearing on the 1999 budget was held, beginning at 6:10 p.m. Ms. Kruse said TRL's goal is to provide high quality library services within the parameters of the budget. Our vision of library service remains constant. Public libraries in a democracy are essential because we provide opportunities for learning, information for decision making, and the expertise to help people get the information they need. We serve people of all ages, all walks of life, and at all economic levels. How we provide this service and information is changing and we have to constantly evaluate what we do and how we do it so we can be responsive to the needs for library service. The focus in the 1998 budget was more open hours and reaching out to young people. TRL prides itself in having state of the art technology, but books and other traditional materials and services are still very important. In the 1999 budget, we are very concerned about keeping the level of the materials budget at 16% and including a wide variety of formats.

Ms. Epting provided an overview of the 1998 operating budget of \$11,779,284. Property taxes are the major source of revenue. The largest expenditures are for personnel and books and materials. The 1999 budget process began in May with goal setting based on the Long Range Plan, meetings of the budget committee which consists of administrative staff and three TRL Board members, reviewing, prioritizing and refining the budget requests. In 1997 the legislature passed and voters approved Referendum 47, which does not allow taxing districts to automatically increase their budgets by 106%. Taxing districts are now required to pass two levy resolutions, one at the Implicit Price Deflator (IPD) and the other as a "Substantial Needs" budget. The IPD is the consumer index written into the law which we are required to use. In 1998 the IPD was 1.9%; in 1999 it is .85%. Ms. Epting surveyed other library districts on their budget plans for 1999, but this information is not yet available. In 1998, all library districts in the state adopted maximum "Substantial Needs" budgets at 106% except those districts which were already at the 50 cent cap and they levied as much as they could. TRL was the only library district in the state which did not levy a 6% increase.

Ms. Roose said the .85% IPD budget would maintain current staffing, including salaries and benefits, would cover increased contract costs, and maintain the book budget at 16%. The .85% IPD budget would also allow us to provide additional staffing in new and expanded buildings to keep up with demand, create more programs for adults, provide better maintenance of TRL-owned buildings, hire on-site managers for the two largest libraries, and keep pace with inflation.

Ms. Epting presented the .85% IPD budget and 5.53% "Substantial Needs" budget in pie chart format showing revenues and expenditures. She explained that in the IPD budget, the .85% increase we figure on the property tax levy does not include new construction which is usually about \$200,000. The 5.53% "Substantial Needs" Budget includes everything in the .85% budget, funds all budget requests which staff have determined to be substantial needs, and maintains the book budget at 16% of the total general fund budget. She noted that the timber revenues have not been increased in the 5.53% budget over the 1998

budget. We continue to budget very conservatively in this area because timber revenues are so volatile. Any excess revenues in timber taxes are put in the building fund and the automated system fund.

Ms. Roose said the 5.53% substantial needs budget would provide more open hours for small and medium-sized libraries and new summer Sunday hours in Thurston County. It would increase outreach to youth with more story times, linking the library to day cares and community centers, and joining with AmeriCorps in all counties in the district (currently we work with AmeriCorps in Thurston County only).

Ms. Covell said the materials budget covers a variety of materials we carry in the libraries. One major reason to protect the 16% share of the entire budget for materials is because we have more people to serve in the district. There are more newcomers and various groups in the communities which we have identified to be underserved, such as Native Americans, senior citizens, homeschoolers, and visually impaired. Another major reason is that there are many more materials to be purchased. It is not uncommon, for example, for a popular novel to come out in print format and also in talking book and large print formats. We plan to begin an evaluation of the collection next year which will highlight areas that need improvement. We need to provide a variety of materials in a variety of formats to support the different learning styles and abilities of our patrons. We need a healthy materials budget in order to provide these resources.

Ms. Anderson said many patrons come to the libraries to make photocopies and do research on microfilm. We have several photocopy machines and M-F reader/printers which are becoming obsolete and it is difficult to find parts and maintenance contracts. The substantial needs budget would provide replacement equipment which would meet not only the demands of volume, but also be easy for the public to use.

Ms. Epting said the substantial needs budget includes a modest sum for maintaining the grounds of the nine libraries which TRL owns. We have been fortunate in the past to have Friends of the Libraries help with maintenance and planting but this is becoming more difficult for them to continue. We have also included money to fund a records management program to hire an expert to advise us on how to manage our records and purchase archival storage and shelving.

Ms. Sebbas said that several years ago, TRL conducted an ADA audit of its facilities. This year, we would like to open access to people who are hearing impaired by providing assistive listening devices for public and staff use. Another part of the substantial needs budget is to support the TRL Foundation in its fundraising efforts. There is included a request to fund a development office to help support the foundation's programs. Another part of the substantial needs budget is to participate in regional planning efforts so that we can remain aware of what is happening in the communities we serve.

President Meyer asked for public comments. Mr. Bragg said the total of the substantial needs budget is based on the same percentage increase as last year. If we consider the new construction, the actual percentage increase is about 7%. In the .85% IPD budget, the new construction brings the percentage increase to about 3.2%. He noted there is no press present at this meeting so there will be no press coverage unless TRL puts out a press release. He said we should not be misled by a lack of public concern. There is a need to communicate with everyone. TRL is now committed to planning for the needs of everyone in the five counties, whether they live in cities or unincorporated areas. He thinks TRL needs to take the next step and say they don't know when they will do it but they have the responsibility to build libraries for everyone. He said the public is becoming more aware of this issue. He said there is more talk of Thurston County seceding from TRL and about electing trustees. TRL goes through the requirements of two resolutions and comes up with a super budget, but if the trustees were elected and responsible to the voters every four years at least, they may come up with the same answer but their attitude may be different. One of the ways to alleviate that is for TRL to step up and say they will take responsibility for buildings as well as operations. He thinks the cities will help TRL do this. In the last 10 years, TRL's general fund expenditures have increased by 117%. TRL has been able to produce a lot of new programs. With technological changes occurring and the inability of schools to provide these things, the amount of programs TRL can invent is

unlimited. Sooner or later, people will wonder what is the proper balance. He thinks that balance can be struck if this pressure does not exist between cities and the unincorporated areas regarding building responsibilities. Then there would be one unified library system throughout the five counties and TRL will flourish.

Mr. Nutter asked if the increases in the two proposed budgets are seen as priorities beyond the regular budget or are they simply new programs TRL would be able to do. Ms. Kruse responded that we develop the budget in response to the needs we see in the district. Mr. Nutter asked for clarification of priorities. Ms. Williams responded that basic services would continue, but new hours, for example, would not happen if there were not an increase in the budget. She said these additional services could not be done without the additional revenue in the substantial needs budget. Some of these services could be done with the IPD budget. Ms. Williams said no libraries will be closed, but they would still have the same open hours. She said these budgets would allow either new programs or extensions of current programs. Ms. Kruse added that without the substantial needs budget, it would be difficult in some libraries, such as North Mason, where they need additional staff. If we cannot replace equipment such as copiers and M-F reader/printers, some libraries would not have this service available and patrons would have to go to other libraries.

Mr. Mah said there is a maintenance level of activities where you build in things such as repairs and upkeep. He sees the substantial needs budget as a change in policy because it is asking for an increase above that maintenance level.

Mr. Bragg noted that timber revenue estimates in the 1999 budget are the same as the 1997 budget and this surprises him. Ms. Epting said we budget timber revenues conservatively. In 1998, timber revenues are less than in 1997. Any timber revenue above what is budgeted goes into the building fund and the automated system fund.

Ms. Burns, Community Librarian at Centralia, spoke in support of more hours in the small to medium size libraries. She was formerly librarian at the Elma library and McCleary patrons often came to that library because the McCleary library is open so few hours. Centralia library is open seven days a week most of the year, and she sees patrons from Oakville and Mountain View coming to Centralia. She said TRL could better enhance its services with more open hours.

The following public comments regarding the budget were made during the regular meeting:

Ms. Moore of McCleary expressed her hope that more hours will be added in small libraries like McCleary. Mr. Earsley of Hoodspout added his support for more open hours at the small libraries.

The following written comments regarding the budget were submitted:

"Would love to see the hours changed at Elma library to accommodate students and working parents in the evenings." Sally Hurn

"I am unable to attend the public hearing on the 1999 budget this evening, but I wished to state my support for having summer Sunday hours at the Olympia Library. I was a volunteer at the Library when Sunday hours first began. It was a big hit with patrons from the start, and is now one of the busiest days of the week. It's a time when families can come to the library together, a time when people are often at leisure. I think it is a very important addition to the access we now provide." B.J. Brown

"I am a regular patron at the Olympia Timberland Library, and I would like to state that the Timberland Regional Library (the Olympia Library in particular) provides excellent library service. I am unable to attend the public hearing tonight due to my work schedule. However, I strongly support having the library open on Sunday during the summer. People in the community have all kinds of different schedules, and

getting to the library isn't always easy to manage. Sunday afternoons are a time when many people are not at work and when many families are able to do things together, and that could include a trip to the library. Sunday is one of the library's busiest days during the winter and spring months, and I miss having that service available during the summer." Brian Barkis

The following are written comments from Tenino Library patrons in answer to a survey question "What could we do better?":

"More hours! One more day per week (4-6 hours) would be wonderful. If not possible, then change days so that Tuesday would be open. Many school children are frustrated by the long period of Sunday through Tuesday being closed—they cannot get in for homework help for Monday school assignments until Wednesday after school."

"More open hours would be great. I am very pleased that the library changed its hours to include Fridays & Saturdays."

"Have more computers. Open 5 days a week."

"Need more hours—Sat. to Wed. is too long to be closed."

"I think the hours need to be changed or discussed. I liked the library opened on Tuesdays. I don't necessarily care if it's open on Saturdays."

"Be open earlier than Wed.! It's a long time from Sat. til Wed.! Many Tenino area people use Tumwater & Centralia, due to accessibility."

The public hearing ended at 7:05 p.m.

- 1 Introductions were made.
- 2 Correspondence and Public Comments

A. Certificates of Appreciation/Commemorative Plaque

A Certificate of Appreciation and Commemorative Plaque was presented for Sally Kauffman, who retired from TRL after 20 years of service. Certificates of Appreciation were presented to the following who have left their respective local library boards: Eric D. Johnson, Lacey; Lauri Kreutz, Ceuson Ratliffe, and Frances Owens, Winlock. Mr. Johnson was present to accept his Certificate. Ms. Strohl expressed appreciation to Mr. Johnson for the four years he served on the Lacey Board through a crucial time of planning for the remodel of the library. He contributed a great deal to bring the project to where we are today. Mr. Johnson said Ms. Strohl will be missed when she retires. She has contributed a great deal to the Lacey library and the remodeling project.

2 B. Public Comments

Ms. Moore reported at last month's Board meeting on her concerns about the McCleary Library Board. Since then, the McCleary Board had a productive meeting which Ms. Schiltz and Ms. Kruse attended. Many of their questions were answered and they had election of officers. The local board members are working on updating a board member handbook, a copy of which will be in the library. She understands library card signups have increased at McCleary. She missed the budget hearing, but wanted to express her hope that more hours will be added in small libraries like McCleary. She attended the recent local library boards workshop. She was at first disappointed that there wasn't more information for how to be a board member, but now understands the message at the workshop of the library's role in the future will be inspiring for them. Some incredible ideas came up in the breakout session she attended. She would like to see the district rely on local boards more to promote the library's services. Ms. Moore praised the TRL staff and said they are, without exception, some of the finest people she has met. She is looking forward to a great future.

Mr. Bragg said at the last board meeting in Mountain View, Jean Davies commented that the TRL Board needs to discuss at a board meeting or at the board's retreat the issue of whether the law should be changed to allow authority to issue bonds for 20 years. He said this would be an innocuous change and would not commit the library. The Olympia Chamber of Commerce and the Thurston County Taxpayers Association have gone on record in support of this change. Mr. Bragg has heard concerns about going in debt and that it would be equivalent to a credit card situation. One of the main points in a public finance course he taught is that one should not borrow for a longer period than an asset will last. An additional advantage is that newcomers will help pay off the debt. In TRL's budget, assuming that timber revenues will be \$3 million, the amount used for operating purposes is 45% of that \$3 million. In his proposal, what it would cost for debt service to build a library for everyone at \$150 a square foot at 6/10 of a square foot per person (the standard the consultant used for the Olympia library), TRL would need 50% of its timber revenue. At the present time, his proposal is doable. He hopes TRL can at least support this change in legislation.

5 New Business

A. Declaration of Surplus Property

Ms. Epting said all the libraries have received a copy of the list of items and staff may look at the items prior to the sale to see if there is anything that they could use in their library, except the computer equipment. We have made arrangements for Goodwill to take any items which do not sell at the sale. The sale will be advertised in the newspapers.

B. Harold Robertson, Thurston Regional Planning Council

Mr. Robertson was invited to explain the services provided by the Thurston Regional Planning Council and discuss the possibility of TRL joining the Council. Mr. Robertson said members of the Council include the Cities of Lacey, Olympia, Tumwater, Yelm, and Rainier, the Town of Bucoda, Thurston County, Port of Olympia, Intercity Transit, and three school districts (Olympia, North Thurston, and Griffin). These members decide the programs and the funding is a combination of dues paid by the members and from outside sources. The Council provides some contract services. For example, TRL has contracted with the Council for maps and charts. One of the major programs is information services. The members have the ability to get some custom data work done. Another program is transportation which is one area where the Council has decision making authority under federal and state law. Another area is a category loosely called other regional issues. The Council in the past two years has continued to develop as a convener on discussion of important regional issues, trying to be a think tank or focal point for community dialog. One of the issues the Council began in 1997 is taking a look at the infrastructure and capital investment plans of jurisdictions in Thurston County. They found that transportation is about 60% of the planned expenditures in the community. A lot of jurisdictions are counting on the same grant funds. The pocket book of the Thurston County taxpayers being able to pay for this whole array of capital facilities in all of the jurisdictions puts everyone in the same boat and is a big issue. This information led to an assessment of Thurston County's economy. A consultant prepared a report of baseline data. The Council in its convener role has sponsored some morning meetings to discuss the economic assessment of Thurston County. Mr. Robertson thinks this discussion has been effective and that the Council will want to continue considering the public sector implications. The Council has about a \$1 million budget. Members' dues are figured on a combination of population of the entity and adjusted by a factor that the Council determines to represent the level of benefit. If TRL becomes a member, he thinks the dues would be similar to the Port of Olympia and Intercity Transit and amount to about \$17,000 annually. He invited TRL staff and board to come to the Council's November 6 meeting if TRL is interested in joining. He suggested TRL consider what benefit it would receive as a member and what benefit current members would receive if TRL joins the Council. The voting system is set up as one vote per member. TRL would need to request membership and it would have to be approved by the current members. Mr. Bragg asked how the Thurston Regional Planning Council coordinates with other counties. Mr. Robertson said the Council recently produced some data on inbound and outbound transportation patterns. There is some general coordination on planning issues.

6 Reports

A. Services and Facilities Plan

The Community Advisory Committee held its first meeting this week. The next meeting is November 12, 6:00 p.m., at the North Thurston School District's office. The focus of the next meeting is on facilities. After the committee reviews the service standards and models of service produced by the working groups, it will put together a Services and Facilities Plan which will be taken out to the communities throughout the district in public forums for public comments. After public input, a final document will be presented to the TRL Board for approval. Since Carolyn Dobbs is no longer on the Services and Facilities Coordinating Committee, the board may wish to appoint another member. Jean Davies has expressed an interest in serving on the committee. It was agreed Ms. Davies will serve on the committee. Since the Community Advisory Committee meetings are being advertised and are open to the public, any of the TRL Board members may also attend.

B. Foundation

The Foundation Board's next meeting is November 9. The board will discuss its infrastructure and will be considering its letterhead and gift envelopes. The Foundation is beginning to move into fundraising. Many non-profits are getting involved in looking for sponsorship dollars. Ms. Sebbas has taken this issue to administration. There will be a meeting of Management Council and Youth Services staff to discuss a sponsorship policy for the district. At All Staff Day on October 12, staff contributed \$700 to the Foundation. Helen Hepp presented a \$1,600 donation from Grays Harbor Literacy to be used for literacy materials in Grays Harbor County.

C. Summer Reading Program

This year's Summer Reading Program (SRP) theme was "Travel the Reading Highway." Ms. Winfree presented a final report. This is the first year that a program book was published for young adults. Bus companies in four of the five counties joined in this year's program in a variety of ways. This year 16,913 patrons, including some adults, signed up for this program and 6,628 finished. Participants set their own goals this year. The SRP is an effort of the entire library staff. We could not manage the program without our young volunteers in some of the buildings, which equaled 2 FTE this year. With the help of volunteers, our professional staff is able to spend more time with the children. Local businesses provided incentives and Northwest Trek again provided free passes for all finishers. TRL budgets money for three paid performers to provide programs in all the libraries. Ms. Saynisch said she enjoyed her first year working on the SRP. Her department produced approximately 41% more SRP pieces this year than last year.

D. Long Range Plan Action Plan Report May-August 1998

Staff are still compiling the May-August 1998 Long Range Plan Action Plan Report which will be distributed later.

E. Director

Payroll and payroll related vouchers for September 1998 amounted to \$667,267.89.

- 6E Voucher No. 55110 (\$31,110) to Bell Anderson is for property and liability insurance which covers TRL's buildings, vehicles and the contents of the buildings. This premium is a decrease from the previous year. Voucher No. 55194 (\$500) is for the Foundation's filing for a 501(c)(3) for an IRS number. Mr. Mah asked if the vouchers could be sorted by purpose rather than in numerical order. Ms. Epting will check into this possibility.

MOTION CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

The September 1998 Revenues and Expenditures report was presented. Personnel: Ms. Roose announced that Mary Strohl is retiring from TRL in November. She expressed appreciation for all that Ms. Strohl has accomplished since she has been with TRL. One of her greatest strengths is hiring good staff. Ms. Strohl has worked hard on the Lacey remodeling project and, in fact, postponed her retirement for that purpose. Ms. Strohl said it will be difficult for her to leave TRL. She will leave when all the specs and blueprints have been approved and the project goes out to bid. The budget hearing was held prior to this meeting. The Budget Committee, which includes three TRL Board members, will need to meet again to review the written and oral input received from the public. Building Projects: About 600 square feet will be added to the Mountain View library which will provide a meeting room and space for the children's area. The library will close October 31 and reopen November 7. The Ocean Park library recently closed for installation of new carpet, rearrangement, new computer furniture, and new shelving. Ms. Schiltz reported that although the Tumwater library is fairly new and opened with the latest technology, there is not the privacy needed on the public computers and the skylight is distracting for people working on the computers. The library will be closed for two days to move the computers around for more privacy and better lighting. The TRL Board's Retreat will be held on November 10, at 4:00 p.m., at the Service Center. Board members should let Ms. Kruse know of agenda items. It was agreed that Ken Bragg's proposal will be discussed at the board's November 18 regular meeting rather than at the retreat. Board members were requested to bring their calendars to the November 10 retreat in order to schedule a meeting to evaluate the Library Director. The Local Library Boards Workshop was held on October 17. Ms. Williams reported that the turnout was a little less than in previous years. The activities and involvement were at a high level. She particularly enjoyed the afternoon speaker Gordon Jackson who talked about old and new media. The Media Training on October 20 was well attended by staff and board members. The speaker, Sue Silk, of Media Strategy has a 25-year background in media techniques and advice about how to turn a media opportunity into an advantage. The training was tailored to TRL and its issues. The September 1998 Statistics were presented.


2 B. Public Comments

Mr. Earsley added his support for more open hours at the small libraries. He expressed appreciation for the building that was barged from North Mason to Hoodspout two years ago October 24.

There was no further business and the meeting adjourned at 8:50 p.m.
